§2. Money trail — campaign finance (OpenFEC, 2024 cycle)

The Resident Commissioner is a federal legislator, not a contract recipient — so the money trail here is the *campaign-finance* side of the public record (federal contracts are covered in §3 as PR-jurisdiction context).

The high individual / low PAC ratio is consistent with a small-dollar, grassroots-funded federal House race — the 2024 cycle receipts are below the ~\$2–3M median for freshman House members, and the average individual contribution is well under the \$3,300 FEC per-election limit.

§3. Money trail — Puerto Rico jurisdiction context

Pablo José Hernández Rivera represents all 78 Puerto Rico municipios as the island's sole federal voting member. This section grounds his office in the federal money flows touching the jurisdiction he represents — *context, not performance*.

Context, not performance. FEMA Public Assistance funding flows to a jurisdiction based on damage assessments, population, and infrastructure exposure — not on the advocacy of any individual officeholder. This figure is provided so the reader understands the federal recovery landscape Pablo's office operates in; it is not attributed to his or any other elected official's effort.

The poverty-rate distribution is bimodal: a small set of high-income urban suburbs (Guaynabo, Bayamón) and a long tail of rural municipios (Adjuntas, Lajas, Maricao) at 55–65% poverty. The PR-wide 45.3% average is materially higher than the US 50-state average (~12%).

PMI (Institute of Economic Planning for Puerto Rico): recent values include 53.8, 45.7, 51.1, 55.1 (a mix of expansionary and contractionary readings). Manufacturing PMI > 50 indicates sector expansion. (Source: [IEPR Indicadores](#))

§4. Network + relationships (the federal money map)

For a federal legislator, the relevant "network" is the set of federal contractors, agencies, and fellow PR federal officeholders that shape the political-economy landscape. The table below shows the top 10 federal contract recipients operating in PR by total obligated dollars.

PR has a single federal voting seat. González Colón is now Governor of PR (since January 2025); Pablo succeeded her as Resident Commissioner. The political-economy network for PR federal advocacy is therefore largely a single-actor story, with the Governor as the most relevant state-level counterparty. (Source: civicapr.com/officials)

§5. Anomaly flags

CivicaPR runs a small set of deterministic SQL checks for every subject in the commissioned-report pipeline. The checks mirror the [public /scorecards hub](#). An anomaly fires only when the public data supports it.

Pablo's identity is consistent across FEC (H4PR01010), Wikidata (Q130997176), and CivicaPR's own official roster (pablo-fernandez-rivera). Sources cite 9 URLs agreeing on name, party, and current office.

No anomalies detected in the public data we examined. The PR-wide federal-contract concentration (Weston + Fluor = 26% of all obligated \$) is flagged on the [CivicaPR scorecard hub](#) as a jurisdiction-level concentration, not as a personal-office anomaly for Pablo.

§6. Risk + limitations (the trust page)

What we looked at

- **FEC:** candidate_id H4PR01010 + principal committee C00831487, 2024 cycle. 1 reported cycle, full receipts / disbursements / cash on hand / individual-vs-PAC mix. Top 10 contributors.
- **USASpending:** 300 PR federal contracts worth \$8.31B, 151 unique recipients, 15 awarding agencies. Top 10 by total obligated.
- **OpenFEMA:** 51 PR disaster declarations since 1956, 45 with Public Assistance funding, \$1.12B federal PA share across 20 distinct funded disasters. Per-disaster deduped (avoids per-municipio inflation).
- **Census ACS 2022:** 78-muni aggregate + min/max for population, median income, and poverty rate.
- **Wikidata:** Q130997176 — identity confirmation, social handles (Instagram only, Wikidata-confirmed), family relationships, source citations.
- **CivicaPR internal:** official roster (38 PR officials), entity catalog (151 federal contractors), scorecard hub (HHI formulas), methodology page.

What we deliberately did NOT look at

- No private individual records (no credit headers, no address history, no employment verification beyond FEC disclosures).
- No Apollo person-level intel. Apollo ORG-level fields are in our public entity catalog only.
- No cell-phone, device, biometric, facial-recognition, or location data. *This is the surveillance red line* — see the project policy in civicapr.com/methodology.
- No "digital prints" or citizen profiles.
- No PR commonwealth-agency operating budgets (CivicaPR does not hold that data; the report says so).
- No social-media sentiment analysis, no in-flight campaign polling, no opposition-research material.

Known gaps + how to read this report

- Pablo has been in office 5 months as of this report. A 5-month incumbent has a thin voting record and limited public-record trail. This report describes the officeholder; the reportable activity of his office (committee assignments, sponsored legislation, floor statements) is on civicapr.com/officials/pablo-hernandez-rivera.

- The "FEMA under-/over-funding ratio" check is jurisdiction-only. It is not run for individual legislators. The PR FEMA context in §3 is provided to ground the office, not to attribute any official's advocacy to a funding outcome.
- The "campaign-finance completeness" check found no anomalies for the 2024 cycle. We have not run the check for any earlier cycle (Pablo's first federal campaign per the Wikidata-confirmed record).
- This report does not opine on guilt, intent, motive, or character. It summarizes public records and surfaces anomalies. The interpretive layer is the buyer's.
